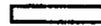

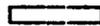

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## President's Report

January 3, 1921.

Commissioners of Abington Township,  
Gentlemen:

For the benefit of the women voters who may want to take an active interest in the affairs of the Township, and the large number of people who have moved in recently, I will give a brief review of the needs of the Township. The chief trouble is that the revenues are insufficient to meet the wants of the taxpayers, especially with reference to lighting, police, fire hydrants, and maintenance of the highways.

There is a constant demand for more street lights. The lighting of York Road and streets occupied by Line No. 49, which was abandoned in September, 1919, by the P. R. T. Co., has greatly increased the lighting expense, even though both of these lines are now poorly lighted. The cost of street lighting has increased as is shown by the following table:

Our police force, though small, is very efficient. This is even admitted by our neighboring municipalities. In addition to the night patrolmen, there should be traffic officers during the day on York and Easton roads, both of which are now the best paved highways in the county.

Police expenditures, due to the higher costs of living, as well as the higher cost of everything needed by the police department, have increased greatly, as is shown by the table given below. The force, however, remains practically the same as 1914.

Rental of Fire Hydrants which in 1914 cost \$1544.13, will cost in 1921, approximately \$5900.00.

The highways are perhaps in no worse condition than in most of the poorer townships surrounding the city of Philadelphia. The Chairman of the Committee and the Supervisor find the task of keeping the highways even in fairly good condition almost impossible for want of sufficient funds; in fact, the situation is all but hopeless at present. A comparative statement of the cost of labor and materials for highway work is given below.

In addition, the automobile traffic has more than trebled since 1914, the first year that the Board published a Township Report.

Real estate operators add each year to the mileage of streets with practically no improvements. Lots are sold at comparatively low figures, and houses are built by those who little realize that street improvements cannot be made for many years except at their own expense. The number of miles of so-called "improved streets" is even now greater than funds are available

for proper maintenance, so the taking over of new streets unimproved is out of the question for years to come.

The suggestion is frequently made that funds should be used only to build permanent paving. At the present cost of \$50,000 or more per mile, if the entire highway appropriation were used, only about one-half mile could be built annually. The following main highways should be paved with asphalt or concrete paving:

The cost of reconstructing these roads with modern paving would be over \$1,000,000. A bond issue at 5% for 20 years would cost the taxpayers for sinking fund and interest annually over \$80,000, or two-thirds of the present revenues.

A more practical and economical plan would be to provide funds annually for constructing new, about one mile of road. As the laws stand at present, this could only be done by making the assessment of the Township 1.4 times what it is at present.

The new association of first-class Townships, which was formed during the past year through the efforts of your Board, may, it is hoped, be able to get from the Legislature, authority to obtain additional revenues, and also a further revision of the Township code, both of which are badly needed—if the business of first-class Townships is to be conducted in an up-to-date manner.

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## Report of Highway Committee

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Charles F. Mebus, President.

Commissioners of Abington Township.

Dear Sir:

I desire to present for your approval, the report of your Highway Committee for the year 1920.

The contract awarded in 1919 to M. J. McCrudden to macadamize Noble Road, District No. 7, and the contract awarded Sutton Contracting Company to lay concrete roadbed on Edge Hill Road, District No. 1, Meetinghouse Road, Districts No. 2 and 4, and Washington Lane, Districts No. 2 and 7, were satisfactorily completed during the Spring.

Portions of Keswick Avenue and Mill Road, District No. 3, and Wood- and Rydal Roads, District No. 1, were rebuilt.

Jenkintown Road, Rosemore, Roslyn and Menlo Avenues, District No. 3, and Hillside Avenue, District No. 7, were surface treated with Barber Asphalt C Oil and Trap Rock chips.

Huntingdon Road, District No. 1, Jenkintown Road and Mt. Carmel Avenue, District No. 6, and Noble Road, District No. 7, had an application of Tarvia Oil.

Tarvia K. P. Cold Patch was used in general repair work on all macadamized roads.

We have one hundred and twenty miles of Township Roads to maintain every year, and a number of these roads need rebuilding, which is impossible, until more funds are procured and the appropriation is increased.

The work of removing the ashes was handled by the Highway Department and was heavier than any previous year.

The Committee wish to thank the members of the Board for their co-operation during the year.

## Report of Fire Committee

Dear Sirs:

Your Fire Committee beg to submit the following Report for the year 1920:

The Abington Fire Co., No. 1, District No. 1, attended twelve fires, one of which was a woods fire and one an automobile.

The McKinley Fire Co., No. 1, District No. 2, attended twenty-nine fires, seven of which were field or woods fires.

The Weldon Fire Co., No. 1, District No. 3, attended twenty-two fires, six of which were field or woods fires and one an automobile.

The Edge Hill Fire Co., No. 1, District No. 4, attended twenty-three fires, three of which were woods or field fires and four were automobiles.

Due to the lack of information furnished on the majority of the reports of these fires, it is impossible to make any comparison of the savings or losses at these fires.

The appropriation to each of the four Companies of the Township was materially increased during the year.

In March of this year the Firemen's Relief Association of Abington Township was organized among the four Fire Companies of the Township for the purpose of raising a permanent fund for the relief of any fireman of the Township disabled while doing public fire duty and also to establish good fellowship among the Firemen of the Township. This organization, although not quite a year old, has made very good progress and seems to have a very prosperous future.

In closing, we beg to ask the earnest cooperation of the citizens of the Township with the workings of the Relief Association and also the Fire Department.
