To the Citizens of Abington Township:

Your Board of Township Commissioners give you herewith the Annual Report for 1933, setting forth a brief summary of the work done by the various departments and committees.

In face of the continued depression and the fact that about \$87,000 of the 1933 taxes were unpaid, as well as a large amount from previous years, the Board continued to carry on, and the following reports will show that through their careful and unselfish effort and strict adherence to business principles, have made a showing that is very creditable. The committees—secretary—treasurer—chief of police and all employees are to be congratulated. Only through cooperation could these results have been obtained. Notwithstanding the curtailed income, the Township is in a very satisfactory financial condition and is numbered among the leading first-class townships in the state.

In the early part of the year our President, Robert A. Tucker, through illness, was forced to relinquish his office, after serving the Board faithfully and efficiently. After a few months he returned and occupied his place as commissioner until the end of his term. Several projects which he originated were carried through to a successful conclusion. The end of the year 1933 witnessed the expiration of the terms of two other commissioners, namely Barnes and Benninghoff, who had served their districts well and they departed with the sincere and best wishes of the members of the Board.

As acting President during the year 1933, I take this opportunity to publicly thank all the members of the board, the officials and employees of the Township for their consideration and kindness. The degree of success attained was due to their splendid support and willing cooperation.

Storm Sewers

A Storm Water Sewer was constructed, at the expense of the Township, in Abington Avenue from Keswick Avenue to Kenmore Avenue, Glenside, Ward No. 12.

After procuring the land by condemnation proceedings for the extension of Elk Street to Geneva Avenue, Glenside Ward No. 3, work was started in the construction of Storm Water and Sanitary Sewers in Elk Street from Geneva Avenue to Weldon Avenue, Weldon Avenue from Elk Street west to low point near Sylvania Avenue and in Center Street from Weldon Avenue to the northerly side of Jenkintown Road. This work will be completed in the spring of 1934.

Reset Curb

The abutting property owners reset the curbs on both sides of Menlo Avenue,, between Easton Road and Stanley Avenue in the Glenside Ward No. 12.

New Curb and Gutter Paving

In Wards Nos. 6 and 9, the Township placed combined concrete curb and gutter paving on both sides of Jenkintown Road, between Tyson Avenue and Cricket Avenue, where the property owners failed to comply with the Ordinance, and liens were filed for the cost of the improvement.

New Curb and Sidewalk Paving

In Wards No. 3 and No. 8, on the southerly side of Edge Hill Road from Bradfield Road to Easton Road and on the westerly side of Easton Road from Edge Hill Road to Jenkintown Road, the Montgomery County Commissioners obtained releases from the adjoining property owners, for adding a strip of land seven (7) feet wide, for sidewalk purposes, to the westerly side of Easton Road and the southerly side of Edge Hill Road, and did the grading.

Abington Township placed the new curb and sidewalk paving.

New Curb, Gutter and Sidewalk

The curb, gutter and sidewalk paving in front of the new Edge Hill Fire House, on Limekiln Pike, was done by the Township forces and at the Township's expense. The Fire Company erected such a fine building that this contribution is fully justified.

Radius Corners

To facilitate turning into to Oakdale Avenue north from Roberts Avenue and into Easton Road from Oakdale Avenue, these corners were reconstructed to larger radii.

County-Aid

Moredon Road, from Second Street Pike to Philadelphia City Line, in the Saw Mill Hill Ward No. 2, was graded and paved with a hard surface by the County Relief forces. Abington Township's contribution was \$3000.

Shady Lane, from Second Street Pike to the railroad, in Saw Mill Hill Ward No. 2, was graded and paved with a hard surface by the County Relief forces. This street being the Rockledge Borough and Abington Township dividing line, each municipality contributed the sum of \$1500.

Maple Avenue, between Jenkintown Road and Susquehanna Street, Ardsley, Ward No. 9, was graded to its full width by the County Relief forces, and a retaining wall along the Turner property was constructed by the same forces. The ash street surface was partially replaced during the winter months and will be completed as material is available. Maple Avenue will someday be a street of considerable importance.

General Highway Work

The Township Highway Forces, in addition to collecting the ashes and rubbish in our Township, did the general maintenance of the highways, (including snow removal), which work is going on nearly the entire year. The following work was also done:

- KEITH ROAD, Ward No. 1—was penetrated from York Road to Wheat-sheaf Lane. 750 feet.
- DAVISVILLE ROAD, Ward No. 5—was penetrated from Easton Road to Moreland Road. 1700 feet.
- STRATFORD AVENUE, Ward No. 5—was surface-treated from Davis-ville Road to Lee Avenue. 250 feet.

LEE AVENUE, Ward No. 5—was penetrated from Stratford Avenue to Maple Avenue. 400 feet.
 SPRUCE STREET, Ward No. 7—was surface-treated from York Road to Runnymede Avenue. 850 feet.
 CHELTENA AVENUE, Ward No. 7—was surface-treated from Spruce Street to Rodman Avenue. 350 feet.
 MENLO AVENUE, Ward No. 12—after the brick gutters were reset the roadway was surface-treated from Easton Road to Stanley Avenue. 1400 feet.
 ABINGTON AVENUE, Ward No. 12—was surface-treated from Keswick Avenue to Jenkintown Road. 1450 feet.
 HIGHLAND AVENUE, Ward No. 12—was penetrated from Jenkintown Road to Wharton Road. 350 feet.

Re-Naming of Streets

CANTERBURY ROAD—Wellington Road, from York Road to Highland Avenue, was re-named "MONROE AVENUE."

MONROE AVENUE—Fernwood Road from Ivy Lane to Jenkintown Road was renamed "MONROE AVENUE."

HAMEL AVENUE—Adams Avenue, from Jenkintown Road north was renamed "HAMEL AVENUE."

MAPLE AVENUE—Avenue "A", from Jenkintown Road to Susquehanna Street, was re-named "MAPLE AVENUE."

CRICKET AVENUE—Avenue "B", from Jenkintown Road to Jefferson Avenue, was re-named "CRICKET AVENUE."

CENTRAL AVENUE—Avenue "C", from Jenkintown Road to Jefferson Avenue, was re-named "CENTRAL AVENUE."

TENNIS AVENUE—Avenue "D", from Jenkintown Road to Cleveland Avenue, was re-named "TENNIS AVENUE."

GARFIELD AVENUE—Avenue "E", from Jenkintown Road to Cleveland Avenue, was re-named "GARFIELD AVENUE."

PENN AVENUE—Avenue "F" from Jenkintown Road to Cleveland Avenue was re-named "PENN AEVENUE".

HEALTH OFFICER:—Inspection of public eating places, drinking places and soda fountains were made periodically by the Health Officer. He was also required to investigate many nuisances including overflowing cesspools and caused the abatement of same.

GARBAGE:—Garbage collection service performed under the contract with Mr. James C. Smith, Dresher, Pa., was satisfactory. Very few irregularities in the collection were reported to the Health Department.

MILK INSPECTION:—Inspection of milk for the Township was carried on under the supervision of the Old York Road Milk Control Board.

The inspection of Pasteurizing Plants and Dairies has been conducted by the Philadelphia Inter-State Dairy Council, at an expense to the Township of \$420.13. The Medical Arts Laboratory of Jenkintown collected monthly, samples of milk and cream from the dealers and made the analysis. This expense to the Township was \$496.47.

Plumbing Inspection

Seventy-six (76) plans of plumbing work (Nos. 1912 to 1987 incl.) were approved and permits issued during the year 1933. Eleven (11) Master Plumbers received Certificates of Registration and thirty-four (34) Master Plumbers renewed their Certificates of Registration for the year 1934.

Seven (7) violations of the Plumbing Ordinance were detected and corrected.

Plumbing Inspector supervised sixty-eight (68) connections of the house drainage sewer to the Township Sewer System.

The Plumbing Inspector compiled a record of sanitary drainage and plumbing fixtures of houses in the Abington Ward No. 1; North Glenside Ward No. 6; Noble Ward No. 7, and Roychester Park Ward No. 10.

Police Committee

A radio broadcasting system was installed during the summer of 1933, when the Police Department of Abington Township received its Federal Radio Permit.

Radio, in the short space of a few years, has definitely established its merits in the police work of such representative cities as New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, Detroit and Atlanta.

The files in these departments bear ample testimony to the effectiveness of this device in crime detection and prevention. The radio is especially valuable to the police in these times when crimes of atrocity are being committed daily throughout the land.

Our Police headquarters are constantly in touch with cruising police cars throughout the Township by day and by night, and we feel the radio now installed has increased the effectiveness of our police force for an emergency equal to the addition of many officers and several cars, and at considerable less expense.

Park and Planning

Messers Holcomb and Furman, owners of approximately fifty acres of woodland near the Baederwood Park, agreed with the Committee to permit the removal of trees by those whose families were in need of wood for fuel.

The applicant in need of wood for fuel secured a permit from the Secretary and the removal of the tree was done under the supervision of the Township Engineer.

This aid of fuel proved to be very beneficial and was greatly appreciated by the recipients.

Zoning

Five petitions were received by the Board of Township Commissioners during the year 1933, for changes of Classification in the Abington Township Zoning Ordinance of 1930. Public Hearings were held and the petitions in each instance, except one, were granted and the Ordinance amended accordingly.

There were three appeals* to the Zoning Board of Adjustment for a variance or special exception to the terms of the Ordinance. These appeals, owing to special conditions and not being contrary to the public interest, were granted.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee recommended to the Board of Commissioners who approved employing Mr. Ernest F. MacDonald, Coatesville, Pa., an expert municipal accountant, for the purpose of installing a new and uniform accounting system in the offices of the Township and Treasurer.

The system, now in use by the Township, is a first-class Accounting System for municipalities of our size, and is proving itself to be financially efficient and beneficial to the officers and heads of the various departments.

The Committees and Departments have all kept within their budget appropriations, as shown in our detailed report of expenditures appearing on pages 16 to 24 inclusive.
