## TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWNSHIP OF ABINGTON

The turn of the half century finds Abington Township a progressive, well-governed municipality with a population of 28,846 persons according to the latest census figures.

Incorporated as a township of the first class in March 1906, it has grown from a rural area dotted with farms and a few hundred homes into a pleasing well-knit residential community of some 9,000 dwelling units. That the township is experiencing a rapid growth may well be attested by the fact that in 1950 alone permits were issued for the erection of 547 new dwellings—the greatest number in any one year in the township's history—at an estimated cost of \$5,968,483. Today, with an area of 15 square miles and more than 100 miles of roads, the township has an assessed valuation of real estate of \$33,500,000.

The growth of the township has naturally been accompanied by a demand for expansion and improvement of municipal services. It has also brought with it a complexity of problems. Your Board of Commissioners are continually striving to provide these services on an efficient and sound financial basis, and it is hoped that you will feel free to bring to the attention of your Commissioners any constructive suggestion you may feel would be for the betterment and welfare of our citizens.

You will find in this thirty-seventh Annual Report to the citizens, a brief review of the activities of the various departments of township government for the year 1950 and a statement of financial condition, together with a directory of churches, schools, polling places and other pertinent information we trust you will find interesting and informative.

Personnel is an essential part of any organization whether it be in private industry or municipal government and we are justly proud and deeply grateful for the services of our employees who through the years have continued to perform their work ably, willingly and loyally.

## **DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS**

The Department of Public Affairs submit a brief review of its activities including a summary of estimated receipts, disbursements and balances in conjunction with the Auditors' Report.

### **Bureau of Library**

The Board of Commissioners approved a contribution of \$750 to the Abington Library Society and \$750 to the Community Free Library Association for the year 1950.

### **Bureau of Miscellaneous**

The Board of Commissioners authorized the annual contribution of \$2,000 to the Abington Township Police Pension Association Investment Fund. The Association closed the year with a balance of \$4,877.25 in the General Fund and \$3,068.48 in the Investment Fund. The Trustees have \$55,649.94 invested in first mortgages, and \$137,000 in United States Government Securities.

### **Sinking Funds**

The bond tax levied and collected for the year 1950 amounting to \$101,500 was deposited into the sinking funds. Orders were drawn on the sinking funds for \$24,238.75 for the payment of coupon interest.

Bonds maturing in the amount of \$290,000 were paid. The total outstanding bonds as of January 2, 1951 was \$2,746,000 with a sinking fund credit of \$391,835.66 or a net bonded indebtedness of \$2,354,164.34.

### **Investment of Funds**

The accumulated or reserve funds in the special accounts and sinking funds amounting to \$1,268,000.00 were invested in United State Government Securities pending the activity of the accounts.

### **Glenside-Weldon Park**

Glenside-Weldon Park containing 2.25 acres adjoining the grounds of the Glenside-Weldon School was conveyed to the School District.

### **Baederwood Park**

The Township acquired five lots adjoining Baederwood Park having a frontage of approximately 412 feet on Highland Avenue. The full width of Baederwood Park now has frontage abutting Highland Avenue.

## **Penbryn Park**

Six lots were purchased from private owners during the year in the area being acquired for the Penbryn Park. Deeds are being prepared for the conveyance of seven additional lots from private owners and an offer has been made to the County Commissioners for acquisition of eight lots now held by them, which will probably be consummated early in 1951.

## **Ardley Park**

The Township acquired from the County Commissioners 4½ lots adjoining Ardsley Park, affording street frontage on Jefferson Avenue and Tennis Avenue.

## **World War II Memorial Park**

It was found to be desirable to simplify the planting plan for World War II Memorial Park to conform with the present grade of the island. The Board of Commissioners approved a revised planting plan prepared by Thomas W. Sears landscape architect, including thereon a list of trees and shrubs that only be planted in the World War II Memorial Park. Application may be made to the Township by individuals or organizations who may wish to plant trees or shrubs as a memorial.

## **Bird Sanctuary and Game Preserve**

Permission was granted to the Kiwanis Club of Jenkintown to supply approximately 2,000 plant seedlings to be planted in the Bird Sanctuary by the school children of this area under the supervision of a qualified nursery.

The township entered into an agreement for the use of the Game Preserve and the Bird Sanctuary as a State Game Propagation Area.

## **DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH**

The Department of Public Health submit a brief review of the activities in the Bureaus of Health, Garbage Collection, and Sanitary Sewers.

### **Bureau of Health**

Physicians during the year 1950 reported to the Bureau of Health 397 cases of communicable diseases.

The Health Officer received 49 complaints of overflowing cesspools and directed the owners to abate the nuisance.

Milk Dealer's Permits were issued to 19 dealers during the year 1950. The Health Officer made 107 dairy and milk plant inspections to see that the requirements of the State and Township regulations for producing and handling milk were carried out.

Pursuant to the provisions of Act No. 369, approved May 23, 1945, the Health Officer made inspections and issued licenses to 55 public eating and drinking places within the Township.

### **Plumbing Inspection**

The Plumbing Inspector reported Certificates of Registration were issued to 196 Master Plumbers and 7 Journeyman Plumbers, and 606 plans of plumbing work were approved and permits issued during the year 1950.

Two-hundred seventy leaching drainage wells and combination septic tank and tile field systems were installed under the supervision of the Plumbing Inspector.

Six Certificates of Sanitary Drainage were issued on forms required by the F. H. A.

Seven hundred eight Sewer Permits for house sewer connections were issued during the year 1950.

### **Violations**

There were 5 violations of the plumbing code during the year 1950. The five plumbers were brought before the magistrate and fined for the violation.

### **Garbage Collection**

The Commissioners accepted the bid of Riddle Farms of Westville, New Jersey, for a three-year period from April 1, 1951, to March 31, 1954, in the amount of \$63,000.00 for the collection and disposal of garbage from the entire Township. Garbage is collected from the rear of the houses and hauled away in modern sanitary metal-covered garbage trucks. Household holders are reminded to keep their garbage receptacles in a convenient location near the rear of the house where it is accessible to the collectors at all times.

## Bureau of Sanitary Sewers

Contract No. 13 for the installation of branch sewers in the Abington area was completed May 19, 1950. The assessable portion of the cost thereof charged against the abutting property owners was \$11.17 per front foot.

Contracts Nos. 14, 16 and 17 for the construction of branch and intercepting sewers, force main, and sewage pumping station in portions of the North Hills and Ardsley areas were completed December 29, 1950. The assessable portion against the abutting property owners in the North Hills area was \$7.92 per front foot.

Contract No. 15 for the installation of branch sewers in Glenmore Farms and a portion of Glenside Gardens was completed May 19, 1950, and the assessable portion of the cost thereof assessed against the abutting property owners was \$8.78 per front foot.

Contract No. 18 for the installation of branch sewers in a portion of the Noble area was completed May 20, 1950, and the cost thereof assessed against the abutting property owners was \$4.95 per front foot.

The Board of Commissioners on October 19, 1950, adopted Ordinance No. 662 authorizing and directing the issuance of General Obligation Bonds of the Township of Abington in the maximum amount of \$900,000 for the purpose of providing funds for and toward the cost of the construction of a complete sanitary sewer system for the use of the Township. Of this amount, the sum of \$500,000 was issued pursuant to approval of the electorate at the primary election Tuesday, May 16, 1950, to finance the cost of the constructing the non-assessable portion of intercepting sewers, force mains, and sewage pumping stations in other areas of the Township yet to be sewered. The remaining \$400,000 is for the construction of branch sewers.

Glore, Forgan, New York, jointly with DeHaven, Townsend, Crouter and Boding, Janney and Co., Aspden, Robinson and Co., 40 Wall Street, New York, were the successful bidders for the \$900,000 bond issue, interest rate of 1½% and a premium of \$2,520.

The Board awarded five contracts during the year for the extension of the sanitary sewer system in the Township of Abington.

Contract No. 19 was awarded to A. DiSandro Contracting Corp., Philadelphia, in the amount of \$116,044 for branch sewers and force main in the Abington Village area.

Contract No. 20 was awarded to Tri-County Constructors, Elkins Park, in the amount of \$29,974 for a sewage pumping station in the Abington Village area.

Contract No. 21 was awarded to A. DiSandro Contracting Corp., Philadelphia, in the amount of \$115,157.85 for branch sewers in the Meetinghouse Road area at Township Line Road.

Contract No. 22 was awarded to A. DiSandro Contracting Corp., Philadelphia, in the amount of \$76,772.05 for branch sewers in a portion of the Glenside Gardens area, and trunk line sewer through Baederwood Park.

Contract No. 23 was awarded to A. DiSandro Contracting Corp., Philadelphia, in the amount of \$121,562.25 for branch sewers in a portion of the North Hills and Ardsley areas.

The site for the pumping station under Contract No. 20 was purchased by the Commissioners in December, 1950, for the sum of \$2500, being a 100 foot lot situate on the northwest side of Huntingdon Road 153.71 feet northeast of Horace Avenue.

Weekly readings and inspections were made of the sanitary sewer meters.

The quantities measured by each meter in 1950 were calculated and they are as follows:

Stewart Avenue—81.377 million gallons  
Highland Avenue—20.283 million gallons  
Cadwalader Avenue—5.174 million gallons  
Fisher Road—4.141 million gallons

## **SEWER AGREEMENT — TOWNSHIP OF UPPER DUBLIN**

The Commissioners of the Township of Abington entered into an agreement with the Township of Upper Dublin July 1, 1950 providing for the receipt, conveyance, pumping and treating of sanitary sewage from that portion of the Township of Upper Dublin lying within the Sandy Run drainage area which drains by gravity to a meter located at Mt. Carmel Avenue and Chelsea Avenue, from an ultimate population of 2500 persons. Upper Dublin's share of the capital outlay made by Abington to provide this service to Upper Dublin, shall be paid to Abington in equal semi-annual installments of not less than \$3,733.28 commencing on February 1, 1951 and ending on August 1, 1975. In addition to said payments Upper Dublin shall pay to Abington a proportionate share of the cost of operating and maintaining the pumping station and of the Sewage Treatment Plant and of maintaining and repairing the force main and intercepting sewers.

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## **SEWER AGREEMENT — TOWNSHIP OF UPPER MORELAND**

The Commissioners of the Township of Abington entered into an agreement with the Township of Upper Moreland December 11, 1950 providing for the receipt, conveyance, pumping and treating of sanitary sewage from that portion of the Township of Upper Moreland lying within the Sandy Run drainage area which drains by gravity to a meter located at Moreland Road and Cleveland Avenue, from an ultimate population of 1326 persons. Upper Moreland's share of the capital outlay made by Abington to provide this service to Upper Moreland shall be paid to Abington in equal semi-annual installments of not less than \$1,868.51 commencing on February 1, 1951 and ending on August 1, 1975. In addition to said payments Upper Moreland shall pay to Abington a proportionate share of the cost of operating and maintaining the Sewage Treatment Plant and of maintaining and repairing the intercepting sewers from Cleveland Avenue and Moreland Road to the Treatment Plant.

## TOWNSHIP OF ABINGTON SEWAGE TREATMENT PLANT SUMMARY OF OPERATION DURING THE CALENDAR YEAR 1950

At the end of the year 1950, the sewerage system contributory to the Township of Abington Sewage Treatment Plant consisted of two sewage pumping stations and approximately 32 miles of sanitary sewers, ranging in size from 5 inch laterals to 24 inch intercepting sewer.

The treatment plant was in continuous operation during the year, with the entire sewage flow receiving complete treatment. Operating personnel consisting of a Chief Operator, Assistant Operator, and four Attendants provided attendance to operations around the clock.


The available treatment facilities in 1950 consisted of: a comminutor for shredding large solids; two float controlled sewage pumps with pumping rates ranging from 750 to 4,000 gallons per minute; one rectangular primary settling tank with straight line sludge collectors and scum troughs; one aeration tank with swing diffusers; two rectangular secondary settling tanks with straight line sludge collectors; two chlorine contact tanks; one heated sludge digestion tank with floating cover for gas collection; and two sludge drying beds. In addition to the main plant units as described, the following appurtenances and systems were also utilized: (a) the various pumps, blowers, and piping essential to activated sludge treatment and sludge digestion; (b) a gas collecting and burning system utilizing sewage gas as fuel for heating the sludge digestion tank contents, for building heat, and to provide hot water for plant consumption; (c) a chlorine application system with facilities for pre-chlorination, return sludge chlorination, and post-chlorination; (d) a utility water system utilizing the treated sewage for all flushing connections and for wash-down of the various tanks; (e) metering equipment for recording incoming sewage flow, return activated sludge, waste activated sludge, and compressed air; and (f) a well equipped laboratory.

The regularly scheduled maintenance program followed by plant personnel resulted in trouble free operation of all mechanical equipment and treatment units. Particular attention was given such items as lubrication, pump packings, frequent checking and adjustment of automatic controls and meters, and routine cleaning and checking of all treatment units and devices. During the year, all exposed piping and metal work was painted by plant personnel.

During 1950, a total of 279,305,000 gallons of sewage was treated. From this sewage approximately 189,000 cubic feet of wet sludge solids were removed and charged into the sludge digestion tank. The temperature of the digester contents was maintained at 88 degrees Fahrenheit. The digestion of these solids resulted in the production of 1,947,326 cubic feet of gas which was utilized as fuel. In maintenance and operation of the activated sludge portion of treatment, an average of 1.62 cubic feet of air per gallon of sewage was applied. The settled activated sludge was returned to the aeration tanks at an average rate of 38.6% of the incoming sewage flow. An average of 0.4 parts per million of residual chlorine was maintained in the final effluent after 30 minutes contact time. The chlorine dosage required to maintain this residual averaged 33 pounds per million gallons of sewage treated. Numerous routine laboratory determinations were made daily with the results being utilized to control the various treatment processes employed and to measure plant efficiency.

Throughout 1950, a stable, highly oxidized effluent was produced by the Treatment Plant. Approximately 93% of both the Suspended Solids and Biochemical Oxygen Demand loadings were removed in treatment. The high degree of oxidation is indicated by the average Nitrate Nitrogen content of 16 parts per million and the 99% Relative Stability of the secondary effluent. The resultant water—clean, sparkling, chlorinated for disinfection, and free of obnoxious materials—was discharged into Sandy Run.

## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY

The Department of Public Safety submits a brief review of the activities in the Bureaus of Police, Fire Protection, and Building Regulation and Zoning.

### Bureau of Police

There were 182 arrests during the year 1950 of which 86 were for violation of Township Ordinances, 108 for violation of the State Motor Code. Sixty lodgers accommodated. Seventy-five meals served to prisoners.

The value of stolen goods recovered amounted to \$32,000.62.

### Police Personnel

Three patrolmen were selected from the Civil Service Commission list of eligibles to fill vacancies and provide one additional officer. One assumed his position June 1, 1950 and the other two assumed their positions January 1, 1951.

Patrolman Henry W. Jiles retired on pension June 1, 1950 after having been a member of the Police Force since November 20, 1925.

### Traffic Regulations

Standard corner post traffic signals were installed at the intersection of York Road and Rodman Avenue, and the blinker signal system at Jenkintown Road and Meetinghouse Road was replaced with standard traffic signals during the year.

School Zone and Cross Walk signs were painted on highways in the vicinity of the various schools in the Township. A number of regulatory and warning signs were erected at various locations.

### Police Automobiles

The Department replaced three patrol cars with new automobiles during the year.

## BUREAU OF FIRE PROTECTION

The annual audit of the accounts of the five volunteer fire companies appears on page 23 and again indicates to the township they have a well managed and financially sound fire department.

A fire alarm system book, setting forth regulations governing the dispatch of fire companies in the Township of Abington, adopted by the five fire companies of the Abington Township Fire Department and approved by the Board of Commissioners, was placed in operation September 21, 1950. The book includes complete map directories of each street in the township with a notation thereon of the particular fire companies to be dispatched. A copy is on file at the Police Switchboard and at each firehouse.

### Fire Hydrants

Ten fire hydrants were installed during the year making a total number of 320 hydrants in the township service.

### Civil Defense Council

Pursuant to appointment by the Governor of the Commonwealth of the Chief Executive Officer of each municipality as the Civil Defense Director for his respective municipality with instructions to appoint a Deputy Director, an Executive Officer, and Council along the lines suggested by the State, the Abington Township Civil Defense Council was set up as follows:

## **DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS**

The Department of Public Works submit a brief review of its activities during the year.

### **Real Estate Registry**

Sixteen hundred eighty-four (1684) real estate deeds were checked, officially registered, and necessary changes made to the Real Estate Registry Maps.

A Coordinate Map of the Township was compiled together with a street directory and circulated in the various township offices.

### **Building Numbers**

Assigned official numbers to all buildings in Abington Ward 1 and Noble Ward 7 as well as all new buildings that were completed in Wards 3, 5, 6, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13. Official numbers will be assigned when completed in Saw Mill Hill Ward 2.

### **Highway Permits**

Five hundred twenty (520) applications were received and permits issued to open, break, or excavate streets, sidewalks, and/or curbs; to erect, set, or plant poles; under the provisions of Ordinance No. 357.

## **New Construction**

A cement concrete sidewalk was constructed on the southerly side of Jenkintown Road adjacent to the Wood-Dale development.

Corinthian Avenue from Cleveland Avenue to Edge Hill Road is in the process of being improved with combined concrete curb and gutter and the cost assessed to the owners of the abutting properties, under Ordinance No. 622. The work has been recessed for the winter.

## **Parks and Playgrounds**

The usual routine maintenance was performed in the Township Parks and Playgrounds. Top soil and grass seed was placed on World War 2 Memorial Park.

A topographical survey was made of the Ardsley Park in Ward 9 preparatory to making plans for the park that will be developed at some future time.

## **Refuse Collection**

The trucks of the Department traveled a total of 26,073 miles in the collection of refuse. Most of the ashes collected were sorted and placed on unimproved streets, and the remainder of the 2,422 loads of unsorted ashes and non-combustible rubbish collected were deposited on township property in Ardsley. The truck-hours on refuse collection numbered 5,828 and 23,559 man-hours were required for the task.

## **Miscellaneous Work**

The Department erected approximately 11,000 feet of snow fence along various township streets; also erected were "No Parking" signs, "Speed Limit" signs, and "Stop" signs for the Department of Public Safety, and "No Dumping" signs at various locations for the Department of Public Health.

Routine work was performed in connection with the maintenance of streets, storm water sewers, storm water inlets and other drainage appurtenances. All streets were plowed during snow periods, and abrasives mixed with calcium chloride were spread on all slippery street conditions.

## **Bureau of Street Lighting**

The total number of street lights in service at the end of the year is as follows:
